

Well, scientists at Stanford University and the University of California have shown that SRT — Sympathetic Resonance Technology — can work to reduce a wide variety of stresses, including those from EMF — the electromagnetic fields emitted from computers, cell phones, and the like. LASER TOOL

The Bushnell Performance Optics Company, maker of the Yardage Pro rangefinders, also has a nifty gadget called the Laser Practice Pro. The device attaches to a putter shaft and projects a straight line of red laser-light beads onto the ground at a ninety-degree angle to the putter face. The idea is to help players improve their alignment and keep the putter head moving through the stroke squarely, since they're able to see if the putter's face is aligned properly from backswing to follow-through. *\$120; (800) 423-3537; www.bushnell.com*
